Trustees Annual Report for the year ended 31st March 2016

The objectives of the Group are to provide a varied programme that is attractive and challenging for our young people, based on the principles of the Scouting and Guiding movements - "Duty to God, duty to others and duty to self".

The Group is a trust established under its rules which are common to all Groups.

Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Policy, Organisation & Rules of The Scout Association.

The Trustees have identified the major risks to which they believe the Group is exposed. They have reviewed these and established systems to mitigate them.

The accounts have been drawn up on the receipts and payments basis which is consistent with previous years.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS IN THE YEAR

The Group has continued to support the various sections as they organise events and activities for their members. Total membership remained steady when compared with the close of last year at around 80, although a decline against the higher numbers at the start of 2014-15 of 90. The numbers of paying members at the close were 38 in the Scouting sections (2015: 40) and 42 in the Guiding sections (2015: 39).

Collection of subscriptions has continued to be good due to efforts by the Leaders. Subscriptions collection is consistent with our numbers reported for Census purposes. Significant success has been achieved using payment by BACS transfer through internet banking. This has significantly reduced cash and cheque handling. Thorough collection of subscriptions combined with fund raising has continued to be important in maintaining the financial health of the Group.

There were a number of successful fundraising activities during the year. A Whisky Tasting evening including Burns' Night Supper raised £860 (2014-15: £771). The sale of bedding plants in May generated overall income of £468 (2014-15: £412). Sponsored Swims raised £240 and Bag Packing £647 (2014-15: £0). Although Bag Packing tends to attract support from across the Group, other fund raising activities receive sparse support and are largely reliant on parents of former members of the group. This is unsustainable in the longer term and is also failing to achieve the purpose of gaining member and parent engagement from across the Group. Whilst it is recognised that there are many demands on time, unless fund raising activities are better supported, they will become unviable necessitating an increase in subscriptions of roughly £3 per term.

Two areas where parents could make additional contribution to the Group without needing to expend significant time nor effort are Gift Aid and EasyFundRaising.

The Group completed its registration for Gift Aid (started in 2012-13) in 2015-16. The first claim was submitted to HMRC for the Tax Year 2011-12, the last year that we were eligible to claim. HMRC refunded £582 to the Group. Before making further claims, efforts need to be made to get as many parents to return signed Gift Aid Declaration forms.

In order to facilitate current and future Gift Aid collection, it would be of great help if all subscriptions from taxpayers were given with a Gift Aid designation. The required tracking of Gift Aid claims against Subscriptions payment date would be easier if made by Standing Order or Internet Banking (besides improving timeliness of subscription receipts).

The Group is registered with EasyFund Raising. This enables internet purchases made via EasyFundRaising to contribute a small percentage of the value to the Group. EasyFundRaising operates with many major vendors like Tesco, John Lewis, Virgin etc. So far only 7 members are making purchases via EasyFundRaising. Even with this small number of users, the Group still received £34 from EasyFundRaising in the year (2014-15: £0). We need more members to make use of the EasyFundRaising as a simple means of raising additional funds for the Group.

It would be helpful if Scouting had an induction pack similar to Guiding that includes a Gift Aid registration form that could be completed when new members join. In addition this should include details about registering with EasyFundRaising and a form indicating which events (including both section meetings, trips, fund raising, and Hut tidy) that parents would be willing to support.

Our Hut provides both an important resource for the Group but is also a cause of significant expense in running costs, insurance and rent. Major improvement work was carried out in 2015-16 to provide a high quality, modern facility suitable for the 21st century. The project would not have occurred without the very active project management, skills and time commitment of James Radmall. James was instrumental in both the design prage 2 of 7

the new facility with enlarged and upgraded kitchen, and insulated main hall, and in obtaining a grant of £7,500 from Cheshire East. We were also fortunate to receive donations of £500 for the refurbishment from the Rotary Club and £75 from Mr.Wright. Even with these donations (£8,075), the Group still needed to contribute £8,375 for meet the overall cost of the Project of £16,450. The refurbishment has not only provided a much improved facility but also the correction of major deficiencies: rotten flooring, corroded girders, and a breached damp course.

The Group's policy on reserves is to hold an amount sufficient to enable it to meet its liabilities and 'be able to have some contingency cover. The Group's cash reserves now stand at £12,183 despite the major expenditure on the Hut Project. This is a decline on 2015 (£14,760) but still represents a healthy position and consistent with the improvement path since 2012 (2014: £12,210, 2013: £8,628, 2012: £5,037). This funding will enable the Group to undertake improvement work to the small toilet in 2016-17.

Thanks go to our team of Leaders, Assistant Leaders, Young Leaders, Parent Helpers, Parents of former members and many others. All of these people have given freely of their time, and effort, to ensure that the activities are well planned and well received by the section membership.

Trustees include scout and guide section representation to ensure both organisations share equal importance in the group.

We are a visible part of the community and benefit from mutual support from community groups

We partner with local charities to help raise awareness/lend a hand with their aims

We engage with local clubs, societies, charities and community groups to deliver activities that supplement our badge and activities programme.




